Leonard Frank Ware 30/12/1909 –19/11/1941 HMAS Sydney II Crewman Joiner Class 3 by Phillip Leonard Ware

Leonard Frank Ware enlisted in the Navy the day after war was declared. He was posted to Garden Island and served there as a joiner. He was keen to be assigned to a ship and joined HMAS Sydney in May 1941. Growing up I was told he was Ship's carpenter.

Leonard (Lennie) was married to my mother Florence May and they lived at Ashbury, Sydney. They had a daughter who died soon after birth. I am his son and was born in January 1942.

Only recently have I appreciated the loss and hardship that my mother had to face. The loss of a child, followed by the death of her husband, then raising a baby while the threat of Japanese invasion was immanent.

My dad was a cabinet maker by trade and worked at Beard Watsons, Sydney. They were makers of quality furniture which they sold through their store in George Street, Sydney. A beautiful French polished inlaid veneer bedroom suite that he made, for themselves soon after their marriage, has been passed on to me.

He was a very keen fisherman and spent a lot of time fishing the Georges River from Picnic Point where my Grandfather had a weekender.

Mum took many photos of me in case survivors of the Sydney turned up as prisoners of war. Such was the uncertainy of their fate. I know as a child I always hoped my father would come through the door.

He is succeeded by myself, Phillip Leonard Ware, and two grandchildren, Steven Gregory Ware and Glenn Andrew Ware.
